## THE FIRST EUROPEAN CONFERENCE ON SUSTAINABLE URBAN MOBILITY PLANS

The concept of Sustainable Urban Mobility Plans has gained considerable momentum in recent years. Many cities across Europe are currently working to integrate this concept in their daily transport planning practices. The European Commission has promoted Sustainable Urban Mobility Plans for several years, including, for example, through its Action Plan on Urban Mobility (2009) and the Transport White Paper (2011). Several EU-funded projects have brought together stakeholders to facilitate the development and implementation Sustainable Urban Mobility Plans in European cities and towns.

In December 2013, the European Commission published its Urban Mobility Package, announcing its intention to support the further development of the Sustainable Urban Mobility Plan concept and the tools required for its successful application by local planning authorities.

The Commission also announced the establishment of a European Platform on Sustainable Urban Mobility Plans to coordinate all relevant Commission supported activities in this area and to foster a broader exchange. On 12-13 June 2014, this Platform organises the first European

Conference on Sustainable Urban Mobility Plans. Urban mobility planners and implementers from all over Europe will meet in the seaside resort of Sopot near Gdansk in Poland to:

- Learn about the Sustainable Urban Mobility Plan concept and the latest developments in sustainable urban mobility planning from experts in the field
- Attend workshops on hot topics in urban mobility planning
- Exchange ideas and experience and network with fellow planners and other experts
- Find out what European projects can offer local and regional authorities

The first European Conference on Sustainable Urban Mobility Plans will be held under the guiding theme of 'planning for a liveable city'. The conference will offer a creative environment to explore how planning can contribute to improving the quality of life in cities. Participants can learn and discuss their own ideas and experiences in parallel workshops covering a wide array of themes, including:

#### WHAT IS A SUSTAINABLE URBAN MOBILITY PLAN?

A Sustainable Urban Mobility Plan is a strategic plan designed to satisfy the mobility needs of people and businesses in cities and their surroundings for a better quality of life. It builds on existing planning practices and takes due consideration of integration, participation, and evaluation principles.

Definition in 'Guidelines on Developing and Implementing a Sustainable Urban Mobility Plan', 2013

The Sustainable Urban Mobility Plan concept considers the functional urban area and proposes that action on urban mobility is embedded into a wider urban and territorial strategy. Therefore, these Plans should be developed in cooperation across different policy areas and sectors (transport, land-use and spatial planning, environment, economic development, social policy, health, road safety, etc.); across different levels of government and administration; as well as with authorities in neighbouring areas both urban and rural. Sustainable Urban Mobility Plans are about fostering a balanced development and a better integration of the different urban mobility modes. This planning concept highlights that urban mobility is primarily about people. It therefore emphasises citizen and stakeholder engagement, as well as fostering changes in mobility behaviour.


